This Legislative Scorecard details the voting record of all Missouri General Assembly members on critical public policy issues facing the state. It gives you accurate information about how your legislators have voted. The fourteen bills selected represent crucial choices on issues important to the quality of life of all Missourians. The first seven bills had roll call votes in both the Senate and the House, the remaining seven bills only received roll call votes in the House.

Votes recorded in this scorecard include such issues as providing a voice to workers, protecting human rights, expanding quality, affordable health care, and preserving women's reproductive rights. With this scorecard, you have the information to demand that your legislators respond to you, rather than the big money special interests that are trying to dominate our government.

This scorecard is just one way to evaluate your representatives. Much of the work concerning bills and amendments is done in committee and many important bills never make it to the House or Senate floor for a vote. ProVote encourages you to use the scorecard as one tool to understand your legislator's performance.

BILL DESCRIPTIONS AND VOTES

1. SB19, Corporate Franchise Tax: Once fully phased in, the elimination of the corporate franchise tax is expected to cost Missouri over \$85 million a year in lost revenue. The franchise tax was a tax at .000333 percent on companies with over one million dollars of assets and was applied to stock values exceeding ten million dollars. Prior to eliminating the tax Missouri had the 7th lowest corporate tax rate in the country. *This bill passed in the Senate on February 15th by a vote of 28-4 and passed in the House on April 6th by a vote of 105-51. This bill was signed into law by the Governor. A vote against SB19 was a progressive vote.*

2. SB188, Human Rights Act: This bill would have changed the current Missouri Human Rights Act's practice of identifying the factor that contributes to unlawful acts of discrimination. It would have done so by changing the current standard of finding the protected class as a 'contributing factor' to the decision to discriminate, to the standard of it being a 'motivating factor'. This bill would have required employees the burden of proving that their class was a motivating factor in the decision to discriminate. *The bill passed the Senate on March 10th with a vote of 25-9, it then passed the House on April 13th with a vote of 93-63. The bill was vetoed by the Governor. A vote against SB188 was a progressive vote.*

3. SB202, Paycheck Deception: This bill would have silenced the voices of working Missourians by eliminating public employees' right to join and support a union through payroll deduction and would have placed severe restrictions on unions' political actions committees - restrictions no other organization would have. Paycheck Deception is a classic example of union busting. *The bill was passed in the Senate on April 7th 26-8, and a slightly different version was passed in the House on May 10th by a vote of 84-68. The bill died in the Senate. A vote against SB202 was a progressive vote.*

4. SB65, Restrictions on Abortion: This bill requires a second physician to certify that a fetus is not viable if it is 20 weeks or more gestational age, even though a fetus at 20 weeks cannot survive outside the womb and no live birth at 21 weeks ever has survived. The bill removes the woman's mental health as a permissible reason to have an abortion of a post-20-week viable fetus when mental health has always been a factor in an overall "health exception" to an abortion regulation. *The bill was passed in the Senate on April 7th by a vote of 27-5, and passed in the House on May 12th by a vote of 121-33. This bill passed into law on July 14th without the Governor's signature. A vote against SB65 was a progressive vote.*

5. HB163, Unemployment Extension: This bill made Missouri eligible to receive extended federal unemployment benefits. Five State Senators attempted to block the bill through an extended filibuster. The bill finally passed when it was amended to reduce the number of weeks a worker could receive the extended benefit from 26 to 20 weeks. *This bill passed in the Senate on April 11th by a vote of 28-5, and passed in the House on April 12th by a vote of 138-13 and was approved by the Governor. A vote in favor of HB163 was a progressive vote.*

6. HB193, Redistricting: This vote overrode the Governor's veto of the U.S. Congressional redistricting map. This map eliminated a progressive district in St. Louis and created a map that does not accurately reflect the political dynamics of Missouri. *On May 4th, the Governor's veto was overturned in the House by a vote of 109-44 and in the Senate by a vote of 28-6. A "no" vote to protect the Governor's veto was a progressive vote.*

7. SJR2, Photo ID: This Senate Joint Resolution puts a constitutional amendment on the November 2012 ballot to allow requiring proof of citizenship by state-issued photo ID in order to vote. This could disenfranchise over 200,000 registered voters who do not already have an ID, most of whom are elderly, minorities and individuals with disabilities. It could essentially create a form of poll tax for people who have to pay for an official birth certificate. SJR2 must have enabling legislation passed in order to go in to effect if passed by popular vote. This enabling legislation (SB3) also passed the House and Senate with similar votes, but was vetoed by Governor Nixon. *This resolution passed the House on May 2nd by a vote of 102-55 and passed in the Senate on May 9th 25-9. This will be on the ballot in November of 2012. A vote against SJR2 was a progressive vote.*

8. HR39, Affordable Care Act: This Resolution called on the Attorney General to file an independent lawsuit or join twenty state attorneys general in their lawsuit challenging the constitutionality of the federal health care reform legislation. This resolution was aimed at the mandate which requires individuals to have health care insurance. *This Resolution passed the House on January 11th by a vote of 115-46, and received a passing voice vote in the Senate. A vote against HR39 was a progressive vote.*

9. HB61, Minimum Wage: For the fourth straight year, the Missouri House attempted to repeal the Minimum Wage Ballot Initiative that increased the Missouri minimum wage for all workers including tipped employees. This bill would have prohibited Missouri's minimum wage from exceeding the federal minimum wage and eliminated the cost of living increase. *This bill passed the House on March 3rd by a vote of 92-60, but died in the Senate. A vote against HB61 was a progressive vote.*

10. HB28, Pharmacy Refusal: This bill was wrapped into a bill that would have tripled the malpractice insurance coverage that OB/GYNs who perform abortions are required to carry, and the policy limits would have been beyond what insurers sell. The refusal bill was then returned to its original text by way of floor amendment. HB28 would have purported to extend "conscience" rights to pharmacy corporations to refuse to ring up sales of emergency contraception on the faulty premise that emergency contraception is an abortifacient rather than simple hormonal birth control. *This bill passed in the House on April 7th by a vote of 118-38, but died in the Senate. A vote against HB28 was a progressive vote.*

11. HA1 to SB188, Missouri Non-Discrimination Act (MONA): This amendment to SB188 would have added protections based upon a person's sexual orientation to Missouri's Human Rights Statute. The amendment would have changed the laws regarding complaints filed with the Missouri Commission on Human Rights making discriminatory practices toward lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender Missourians unlawful. *The amendment was defeated in the House on April 13th by a vote of 48-103. A vote in favor of HA1 to SB188 was a progressive vote.*

12. HB656, Pay Day Loans: This bill was an attempt at regulation and caps on interest rates regarding unsecured loans of \$500 or less, commonly known as payday loans. This bill would still have allowed more than 1,000% interest on unpaid balances. An alternative was offered with actual consumer protections, but was not brought up for consideration. *This bill passed in the House on April 19th by a vote of 96-58, but died in the Senate. A vote against HB656 was a progressive vote.*

13. HB473, Charter Schools: This bill would have expanded charter school sponsorship to private organizations and individuals with no state accountability for taxpayer dollars. It would have resulted in further reduction in funding for public school districts. Charter schools in Missouri continue to lag behind traditional public schools. *This bill passed in the House on April 27th by a vote of 86-70, but died in the Senate. A vote against HB473 was a progressive vote.*

14. HB138, Prevailing Wage: This bill would have allowed for construction to be done by untrained workers who may or may not be qualified to perform work on our schools. By using prevailing wage you eliminate the low balling of labor costs and the use of unskilled laborers to undercut reputable construction firms to build safe schools for our students. *This bill passed the House on May 9th by a vote of 85-66 but died in the Senate. A vote against HB138 was a progressive vote.*

METHODOLOGY

ProVote, in consultation with our member groups, selected fourteen bills on a broad range of issues to create a progressive index percentage for each legislator in the 2011 session. Because each member group only focused on the bills pertinent to its core mission, this progressive index percentage should be seen as ProVote's evaluation, not as that of all ProVote member groups. Each member group may not have a stance on each bill.

For each bill, the pertinent groups determined whether a vote of "yes" or "no" counted as "progressive."

The progressive index percentage is based on votes cast during the regular session. In cases where the legislator was "absent," the vote was not included in the calculation. In cases where the legislator voted "present," the vote was counted as an unprogressive vote. You can verify all of the votes by going to www.house.mo.gov or www.senate.mo.gov and reviewing the journal for the date of the vote.
